Transmission of hepatitis C virus among people who inject drugs: viral stability and association with drug preparation equipment

"Hepatitis C virus (HCV) transmission among people who inject drugs remains a challenging public health problem. We investigated the risk of HCV transmission by analyzing the direct association of HCV with filters, water to dilute drugs, and water containers."

Are major reductions in new HIV infections possible with people who inject drugs? The case for low dead-space syringes in highly affected countries

"Circumstantial evidence from laboratory studies, mathematical models, ecological studies

and bio behavioural surveys, suggests that injection-related HIV epidemics may be averted or reversed if people who inject drugs (PWID) switch from using high dead-space to using low dead-space syringes."

Pharmaceutical Overdose Deaths, United States, 2010

"Data recently released by the National Center for Health Statistics show drug overdose deaths increased for the 11th consecutive year in 2010. Pharmaceuticals, especially opioid analgesics, have driven this increase. Other pharmaceuticals are involved in opioid overdose deaths, but their involvement is less well characterized. Using 2010 mortality data, we describe the specific drugs involved in pharmaceutical and opioid-related overdose deaths."

Mortality among people who inject drugs: a systematic review and meta-analysis This report systematically reviews cohort studies of mortality among people who inject drugs, examine mortality rates and causes of death in this group, and identify participant-and study-level variables associated with a higher risk of death.

Opioid overdose rates and implementation of overdose education and nasal naloxone distribution in Massachusetts: interrupted time series analysis IDHDP member Dr. Alexander Walley, et al's analysis concludes "Opioid overdose death rates were reduced in communities where OEND was implemented. This study provides observational evidence that by training potential bystanders to prevent, recognize, and respond to opioid overdoses, OEND is an effective intervention."

New treatment gives hope to East Africa's drug users

"The United Republic of Tanzania is the first mainland sub-Saharan country to launch a national methadone programme as part of its battle to fight the twin epidemics of heroin addiction and HIV infection"

Methadone maintenance treatment in Spain: the success of a harm reduction approach

"The rapid spread of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection among people using heroin led to a shift from a drug-free approach to the treatment of opioid dependence to one focused on harm reduction. A substantial change in legislation made it possible to meet public health needs and offer OAMT as part of harm reduction programmes in the public health system, including prisons."

Methadone maintenance treatment and mortality in HIV-positive people who inject opioids in China

The study examines the effect of methadone maintenance treatment (MMT) on mortality in people injecting opioids who receive antiretroviral therapy (ART) for the treatment of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection in China.

Implementing methadone maintenance treatment in prisons in Malaysia

"In Malaysia, human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection is highly concentrated among people who inject opioids. For this reason, the country undertook a three-phase roll-out of a methadone maintenance treatment (MMT) programme. In Phase 3, described in this paper, MMT was implemented within prisons and retention in care was assessed."

Indonesia situation assessment on amphetamine-type stimulants (2013)

"The manufacture, trafficking and use of crystalline methamphetamine is now the greatest illicit drug threat facing Indonesia, according to a jointly-published report released today by the National Narcotics Board of Indonesia (BNN) and the UNODC Global Synthetics Monitoring: Analyses, Reporting and Trends (SMART) Programme."

Addiction to Medicines Consensus Statement January 2013

"Medicines have an important role in healthcare. However, dependence on prescribed and over-the-counter medicines can occur and can be devastating to those affected and their families. Care is needed in the initiation of any drugs that can lead to dependence and in managing the risk and development of withdrawal symptoms."

Report of the Special Rapporteur on torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment

The report focuses on certain forms of abuses in health-care settings that may cross a threshold of mistreatment that is tantamount to torture or cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment. It identifies the policies that promote these practices and existing protection gaps.

Towards revision of the UN drug control conventions: Harnessing like-mindedness

"The article applies an international relations approach, including examples from the UN system in general and other issue areas in particular, to explore how the formation and operation of a group, or groups, of like-minded nations may offer a route towards some form of substantive treaty revision."
